## GOVERNMENTAL BODY SEEKING OPINION

County School Superintendent

#### OPINION SOUGHT

Whether a County School Board of Education needs an exemption from the Ethics Commission to purchase vehicles from an individual whose daughter and daughter-in-law are employed in the county as teachers?

## OTHER FACTS RELIED UPON BY THE COMMISSION

The County Board of Education advertised (in various newspapers) for sealed bids to be opened publicly for the sale of a 1/2 ton cab and chassis, one panel truck, and one small pick up. The only bid was from a company who was owned by an individual who has a daughter and daughter-in-law employed as teachers by the county school board.

# PERTINENT STATUTORY PROVISIONS RELIED UPON BY THE COMMISSION

West Virginia Code 6B-2-5(d)(1) states in part that ...no public employee or member of his or her immediate family... may be a party to or have an interest in the profits or benefits of a contract with the governmental body...with which he or she is employed.

West Virginia Code 6B-1-3(d) defines "immediate family", with respect to an individual to mean a spouse residing in the individual's household and any dependent child or children and dependent parent or parents.

West Virginia Code 6B-2-5(d)(3) states that where the provisions of subdivision (1) of this subsection would result in the loss of a quorum in a public body or agency, in excessive cost, undue hardship, or other substantial interference with the operation of a state, county, municipality, county school board or other governmental agency, the affected governmental body or agency may make written application to the ethics commission for an exemption from subdivision (1) of this subsection.

## ADVISORY OPINION

The key issue here is whether the owner of the company's daughter or daughter-in-law is dependent on him within the meaning of the Act. Since neither teacher (as a public employee) is, there would not be a violation of subsection 5(d)(1).
